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The U.S. P. S. announced that a semipostal stamp to help raise funds for those diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) was issued Dec. 2 at McGlohon Theater at Spirit Square in Charlotte, NC. The Healing PTSD semipostal stamp features a photographic illustration of a green plant sprouting from the ground, which is covered in fallen leaves. The image is intended to symbolize the PTSD healing process. Art director Greg Breeding designed the stamp with original art by

Mark Laita.
Tens of millions of Americans will experience PTSD in their lifetimes. Today, the nation is increasingly dedicated to compassionately treating this mental health issue.
While post-traumatic disorders have long been a subject of study, PTSD was not officially added to the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, a widely used reference guide published by the American Psychiatric Association, until the late 20th century.
The condition develops in some children and adults who have survived a traumatic event. Experiences such as a natural disaster, car accident, physical or sexual assault, abuse, and combat, among others, can trigger PTSD. When the Healing PTSD semipostal stamp becomes available, it will be sold for 65 cents. The price includes the first-class sin-gle-piece postage rate in effect at the time of purchase plus an amount to fund PTSD research. By law, revenue from sales of the Healing PTSD semipostal stamp

- minus the postage paid and the reimbursement of reasonable costs incurred by the Postal Service - will be distributed to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.
The Semipostal Authorization Act, Pub. L. 106-253, grants the U.S. Postal Service discretionary authority to issue and sell semipostal stamps to advance such causes as it considers to be "in the national public interest and appropriate." Under the program, the Postal Service intends to issue semipostal stamps over a 10 -year period, with each stamp to be sold for no more than two years. The Alzheimer's semipostal stamp, issued Nov. 30, 2017, was the first. The Healing PTSD semipostal stamp is the second. Additional discretionary semipostal stamps have not yet been determined.

Above the ship, there is a stylized globe surrounded by the inscription " 500 years since the beginning of the journey around the world", representing his trans -global expedition.
In the upper left corner of the
souvenir sheet is the portrait of Magellan superimposed over a stylized helm and above. The Strait of Magellan and the Pacific Ocean bear his name, the latter called the Magellan Sea until the XVIII th century.

## USPS \$2 Jenny Inverts Now Available through Stamp Fulfillment Store



For those who are interested in purchasing the $\$ 2$ Jenny Invert, it is now available through Stamp Fulfillment Services They may also be available at United states Postal Service sponsored stamp shows while supplies last. The \$2 Jenny stamps were issued as a tribute to America's most famous stamp error, the 1918 24¢ Jenny Invert airmail stamp that has its blue "Jenny" biplane accidentally printed upside down within the carmine rose frame But the $\$ 2$ stamps were at the center of a controversial USPS promotional program that randomly included 100 specially printed panes intentionally
showing the "Jenny" biplane in the center of the stamp design flying right-side up.
Every pane from the 2013 issue was sealed in a printed paper envelope within a cellophane wrapping, thwarting any effort to detect the rare upright variety from among the common standard issue.
The total print run for the issue was 2.2 million panes.
So far, at least 32 of the 100 panes of the upright variety have been discovered by postal customers.
The 100 upright variety panes were packaged with a card printed with a phone number the find-
er could call to receive a certificate signed by the U.S. postmaster general, and to register the purchase and discovery. But because the registration is voluntary, it is presumed that many additional scarce panes were found but never recorded. That uncertainty also means that some of the upright Jenny stamps could still be in sealed packaging, and were returned to Stamp Fulfillment Services.
In 2016, the Postal Service's warehouse inventory of the $\$ 2$ Jenny panes was depleted and they were taken off sale through Stamp Fulfillment Services, but the stamps continued to be sold through some local post offices. The souvenir sheet can now be purchased online at:

## Unusual things delivered by Post...



In 1914, a four-year-old named May Pierstorff, who lived with her parents in Grangeville, Idaho, was going to visit her grandmother in Lewiston. Her parents calculated that Parcel Post was
cheaper than full fare. At 48.5 lbs., the child came in under the weight requirement of less than 50 lbs. It was then legal, and still is today, to mail chickens, so her parents were charged postage at the chicken rate.
The Pierstorffs pinned the fifty-three cents in postage to her coat and put May in the baggage car, under the care of the postal clerk. Though it was customary to leave packages in the post office overnight, when May arrived in Lewiston, the postmaster took her to her grandmother.
By 1920, it was illegal to mail human beings, although not before an angry mother mailed a baby to the husband who had left her.

## Environmental Factors Affecting Stamps and Covers

Temperature, humidity, sunlight, artificial light, copying methods, and air are the major environmental factors which can adversely affect stamps, covers, and philatelic literature. Certain of these factors interact and produce deleterious effects on our philatelic treasurers. Mold spores are normally dormant if the ambient temperature is below 64.5 F . and humidity is below $65 \%$. Otherwise, mold spores flourish and can attack stamps, covers, and other materials. Damage caused by molds is known as "foxing," "rust," or "tropical staining." Molds also constitute a food source for insects, which, are capable of causing irreparable damage. Therefore we must store our philatelic materials in temperatures and relative humidity in which molds will not flourish. Sunlight, can quickly cause a newspaper to become yellow and brittle. Even the best type of paper can be susceptible to the effect of not only direct sunlight but reflected sunlight as
well. Accordingly, we must strenuously resist the temptation to decorate our living areas with framed stamps. If such decoration is desired, it is better to frame and display inexpensive (and easily replaced) photographic copies.. It is becoming known that the light and heat involved in the photocopying process can have a deleterious effect on philatelic materials. Reasonable and appropriate photocopying of philatelic materials for insurance purposes, for example, doesn't present an unacceptable risk. However, collectors who make multiple copies or who copy the same material frequently may wish to consider using digital copiers so as to minimize the effects of light scanning. Philatelic materials that show clear evidence of damage due to deterioration are probably best not exposed to additional potential danger from photocopying process. There is a class of environmental agents whose effects on philatelic materials are not generally understood in so far as we are aware. These agents are the printing media used by computer printers and photocopy machines. When stamps and covers
are mounted near or even on such media, is there, for example, any deleterious migration of the printing media into the philatelic materials? Some collectors even use album pages where the
philatelic material is mounted within boxes having shaded interiors. Are such album pages safe?
Normal air can have an adverse effect on philatelic materials. The damage can be intensified when the air is laden with moisture. The three essential environmental elements necessary for preserving philatelic materials are pure air, a temperature of 70 F ., and $50 \%$ relative humidity. For removal of large amounts of water from the atmosphere, use an electric dehumidifier. For enclosed cabinets and cases in which albums are stored, there are three commonly available and relatively inexpensive drying agents useful in efforts to control excess moisture in the air: 1. Calcium chloride crystals. Spread these crystals in a small saucer or similar container, carefully keeping the philatelic materials from contacting them.

As small pools of water replace the crystals, discard the water and add fresh crystals.
2. Silica gel.

These crystals last for years because after they have absorbed water, they can be regenerated in a hot oven. Silica gel has approximately 40 times the drying power of calcium chloride crystals.

## 3. Activated Alumina.

This agent has a drying power of about 200 times that calcium chloride. It costs about the same as silica gel, but it doesn't last as long. Various atmospheric pollutants must be strenuously guarded against: particulate matter (such as smog), dusts, carbon, and -perhaps most importantly -tobacco smoke.

age stamps issued by Manama, Dependency of Ajman on December 25th, 1969 Manama is a township in the United Arab Emirates (UAE), one of two exclaves of the emirate of Ajman (the other is Masfout). Its land area is mainly given over to agricultural usage. It is known to stamp collectors
as a number of editions of colorful stamps were issued from there in the late 1960s.
Few collectors would realize Manama was a remote agricultural village consisting of a few adobe houses on a plain overlooked by the Hajar Mountains. In 1963, Britain ceded responsibility for the Trucial States' postal systems. An American philatelic entrepreneur by the name of Finbar Kenny saw the opportunity to create a number of editions of stamps aimed at the lucrative collector's market and in 1964 concluded a deal with cash strapped Ajman to take over the production of stamps for the government. These stamps, luridly illustrated and irrelevant to the
actual emirate of Ajman (including 'Space Research' and 'Tokyo Olympic Games') became known together with stamps produced by other Trucial States at the time, as 'dunes'. Between 1966 and 1972, there were a total of only 1255 different Manama postage stamps issued, and therefore there are no Scott stamp catalog \#'s assigned.
