






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Notable People on Stamps:



Issue Date: July 26,.2019
Designer: Mihail VĂMĂȘESCU
Perforated souvenir sheet size: 76 x 110 mm (stamp 36x72mm)
Imperforated souvenir sheet size: 101 x 102 mm
Romfilatelia issued the postage

stamps 'Simona Halep, the Romanian tennis ambassador', made up of one perforated souvenir sheet and one imperforated souvenir sheet in order to honor the tennis player's series of performances and especially winning the Wimbledon title.

The stamp of the souvenir sheet illustrates the image of Simona Halep raising the Wimbledon 2019 trophy.

The imperforated souvenir sheet, is numbered, and it presents Simona Halep's signature in gold foiling and it shows Simona

Halep in the foreground, presenting the trophy to the public. In the stamp of the imperforated souvenir sheet, an image of the game is shown.

Simona Halep claimed on July 13 the first Wimbledon trophy in her professional career, after winning, 6-2, 6-2 against former world number 1 Serena Williams. This was the first Wimbledon trophy won by a Romanian.



New from the USPS for September



USPS will issue the 32nd in the Literary Arts series, on the bicentennial of Walt Whitman's birth. (1819-1892) The stamp will be issued on September 12, 2019, in Huntington Station, NY In the background, a hermit thrush sitting on the branch of a lilac bush recalls "When Lilacs Last in the Door-yard Bloom'd," an elegy for President Abraham Lincoln written by Whitman soon after Lincoln's. Considered by many to be the father of modern poetry. Whitman broke away from European poetic forms and experimented with free verse and colloquial expressions, writing powerfully about nearly every aspect of 19th-century America. The words "THREE OUNCE" on this stamp indicate its usage value. Like a Forever stamp, this stamp will always be valid for the rate printed on it. On September 17, 2019, in Tulsa, OK, the USPS will issue the



Winter Berries stamps. The Winter Berries booklet of 20 stamps celebrates four of winter's small, yet vibrant offerings:

The winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*). The juniper berry (Juniperus communis), The beautyberry (Callicarpa americana), and The soapberry (Sapindus saponaria). The stamp art features highly detailed botanical portraits of each plant that highlight the bold colors and rich textures of their berries

Junior Corner

The Tools of the Philatelists or Stamp Collector;

Odd shaped stamps
The usual shape of a postage
stamp is a rectangle, this being
an efficient way to pack stamps
on a sheet. A rectangle wider
than tall is called a "horizontal
design", while taller than wide is
a "vertical design".

A number of additional shapes have been used, including triangles, rhombuses, octagons, circles, and various freeform shapes including heart shapes, and even a banana shaped stamp issued by Tonga from 1969 to 1985.

The usual size ranges from 10 to 30 mm in each direction, experience having shown this to be the easiest to handle. Many countries use only a limited selection of dimensions, to simplify automated machinery that handles stamps.

The smallest postage stamp on record was issued by



Mecklenburg-Schwerin in 1856, and was a square, with sides measuring 10 millimeters. The biggest stamps in history were used in the United States from 1865 and measured 52 by 95 millimeters, but were used exclusively for mailing newspapers.

WILKINSBURG STAMP CLUB Home of the Famous Satirical Souvenir

50 Years ago - September 1968



On September 9, 1969, the U.S. Post Office issued its first ever jumbo-sized commemorative stamp. The stamp wasn't even announced to the public until July 9, 1969, a week before the launch of Apollo 11. As the postmaster general announced that day, "Apollo 11 will mark America's first mail run to the moon."

This dramatic statement aroused great public interest in the stamp. As the postmaster general explained, the engraved

die for the stamp would be taken to the moon as well as a special "moon letter" with a die proof of the stamp. While on the moon, the astronauts would personally postmark the letter.

U.S. #C76 – Full mint sheet. Among the few people who knew about the stamp was artist Paul Calle. A member of NASA's Fine Art Program, Calle had documented several NASA missions and provided the artwork for the 1967 Accomplishments in Space stamps. Calle's greatest obstacle was that he had to illustrate the moon-landing scene a month before it would happen. To help him create an accurate image, NASA gave him photos of the equipment and invited him to come and view some of it in person. He also got to watch Neil Armstrong practice his exit of the lunar module so he could

accurately portray how he placed his foot on the ground. Many collectors at the time quickly stated that the stamp would violate the federal law that forbids picturing a living person on a stamp. However, the Post Office insisted it was simply a "spaceman."

U.S. #C76 FDC – Classic First Day Cover with both cancels. The launch and landing were a success, but Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin were too busy with science experiments to postmark the letter while they were on the moon's surface. Instead, they did it on the return journey. The "Moon letter" and the printing die were later sent on a traveling exhibit across the country and to foreign nations.

The stamp was finally issued on September 9, 1969 at the National Postal Forum's third annual meeting in Washington,

D.C. Armstrong, Aldrin, and Michael Collins were all present for the ceremony. The stamp was America's largest postage stamp up to that time measuring 1 61/64 inches by 1 15/64 inches, about 50 percent larger than most U.S. commemoratives. The First Day Cover for this stamp was one of the most popular in U.S. history. It included both the First Day of

Issue cancel as well as a replica of the Moon Landing cancel.
